PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We've successfully made it though January, and as the days are starting to stretch, our plants are coming out of their winter rest and starting their spring growing cycle. Our winter blooming species and hybrids should be at about their maximum blooming right now, with many of the spring bloomers showing spikes with the promise of great displays in a month or two.

Since we were not able to have a show this January and visiting the growing areas of other members in person is difficult while this pandemic continues, our Vice President Chaunie Langland came up with a truly inspired idea – virtual greenhouse tours! For many of us, this may provide the chance to see some of the plants and flowers we're missing from not having shows, all in the comfort and safety of our own homes. This is the first time we're attempting something quite like this. There's a lot of imagery to gather, categorize and talk about. I'm sure there will be some minor areas where we can improve in the future, but this could well become a great addition to our monthly skill sessions, or supplement the show and tell table.

Don't forget that if you've renewed your POS membership for 2021, we have a membership gift plant for you (one per membership regardless of membership type). These are at my greenhouse growing area in Half Moon Bay, and once your membership is confirmed by our membership director, please feel free to make arrangements to pick up your plant. We had thought of having a competition with these Cattleya seedlings, but they're bigger than we had expected. Quite a few are in spike and one or two have even started to bloom. It wouldn't be much of a blooming competition if the plant you receive is already in bloom, but instant gratification is great. We'll arrange a growing and blooming competition sometime later in the year with other plants. Remember the number of these gift plants is limited, so they will be allocated on a first come, first served basis until all the gift plants are distributed.

It's appearing more likely that we might be able to do a small show perhaps in late July or August. Of course, a show at that time wouldn't include the same types of blooming plants we typically see in our January show, but that isn't a bad thing. It's very seldom we see Cattleya (Laelia) purpurata, Cattleya (Laelia) tenebrosa, or the large summer blooming bifoliate Cattleyas at a show, so this could be a very special treat. We'll know more on whether this is possible in the next couple months, and we'll keep you informed.

As I mentioned last month, this is your club. The board members are here to help things go smoothly, and to ensure the club functions the way you want it to function. If you have ideas or comments, please, send them to us!



We are very pleased with these results and will likely plan another sale before the summer! We'll try to increase our offerings of plants in the \$5-20 range, since those sold the best this time around.


Would you be likely to attend the monthly meeting more often our meetings were held on the third Tuesday of the month?

Answered: 38 Skipped: 2




Would you attend a special Saturday or Sunday late morning meeting instead of our regular meeting day one month if it allowed us to have a speaker from Africa or Asia?

Answered: 38 Skipped: 2




Would you be interested in POS holding a show during the summer or fall if that should become a viable option?

GREENHOUSE ETIQUETTE

As we're enjoying the presentations of the virtual greenhouse tours during this month's meeting, our thoughts naturally turn to actual tours of growing areas from our other members. Of course, this is difficult right now, but not impossible if appropriate protective measures and social distancing are strictly enforced, and should become easier as the Spring comes and more of our members have become vaccinated against COVID-19.

When the opportunity does come to visit the growing areas of other members, remember this is a special place for them, wherein they have some of their most precious and prized possessions. This is the member's inner sanctum, their place of peace and calm, where they go to enjoy their plants for a while, and forget about the rest of the world. Should you be fortunate enough to be invited to share this with them, above all, do so respectfully. Here are some simple ways to ensure such a visit is enjoyable for all involved.

- Growing areas are intended for plants first, and people a distant second. After all, the plants are there 24/7, and people are there for only a small amount of time each week. As such, the aisles are often narrow with leaves or roots hanging into the passageways. Do all that you can to ensure you can pass safely down these paths without causing damage. Most important would be to find a safe place to put any purses, bags, backpacks, or other items so they are not carried down the aisles. One quick turn in a crowded aisle with a large bag over your shoulder, and plants could be scattered. If you don't see a good spot to put your items, ask where they can be safely stored.
- Growers are passionate about their plants and very, very, very careful with how
 they're grown. Never touch a plant without asking. Better yet, ask the grower about
 the plant and perhaps they will bring it out for you to see more closely. Remember,
 they want to show you their prized possessions, and a simple question about a plant
 will often result in a wealth of knowledge about growing and blooming.
- Every grower has their own way they write labels and put them in the pot, or attach them to the plant. If the label is hard for you to read because of the way it's placed or how it's written, ask the grower. Never remove the label from the plant! I've had occasions when great growers have visited my growing space, and after their visit! found half a dozen labels on the benches. In most cases, I knew which plant was which so! was able to replace the labels, but this could be a way that a valuable plant becomes a NOID (No ID) plant.
- Another topic in the 'don't touch' category is roots. Many growers have mounted or
 hanging plants with long luxurious roots hanging several feet below the mount or
 pot. These roots can be relatively easily damaged, so running fingers through the
 roots just shouldn't happen. If the plants are hanging such that the roots are in the
 aisle, avoid them as much as possible when walking under them.
- Most growers have an area where they've stockpiled supplies for future repotting, staking, cleaning, or other purposes. They've often spent a considerable amount of time, effort, and money to accumulate what they believe they'll need in the near future to take care of their plants. If they should offer you some of their supplies, be thankful. If they don't mention their supplies, don't ask if you can have some of them.

- It's also common for most growers to have duplicates or divisions of some plants available for other people to grow. Remember, these growers aren't commercial, so the amount of money they may get from selling a few divisions can't even come close to supporting their orchid obsession. What it does provide them is a way of making more space in their (always) too small growing area. Space really is the last frontier. If you see a plant you'd like in their 'plants available' area, ask what they want for the plant. If it sounds reasonable to you, great! You have a new plant. If it's beyond what you want to pay, you might ask if there's a smaller piece available, but don't automatically try to bargain for a lower price. They've already provided what's probably a very fair price, and asking for a lower price will not be perceived well. Remember, they're selling a piece of their prized plant, not because they need the money, but because they need the space.
- Lastly, if you want to take photos, just ask. Most growers will gladly allow photos.

So, this isn't intended to be a complete list, nor was it my intent to dwell on don'ts as opposed to dos. If a grower's special area is treated with the respect you would like your areas to be treated, all involved will enjoy the visit.
