### **Tim Culbertson**



Although I teach middle school kids for a living, one of my passions has always been plants. I began growing orchids as an offshoot from working at Longwood Gardens in Philadelphia just after college. From the very beginning it was all about Paphs, particularly awarded and select clones of historic importance, of which my collection numbers nearly 1000. While I love finding old, rare stepping stones in paph breeding, I also do a little hybridizing of my own, and growing up my own babies is a blast. I enjoy making my culture the best it can be, and I have had numerous experiences with professional growers in California and on the East Coast, which has helped tremendously.

I am an accredited judge with the American Orchid Society, and have served in various capacities with local orchid societies. I love meeting other people who like orchids too, and doing so often finds me traveling to shows, vendors, and peoples' greenhouses to see the latest and greatest in new hybrids and to get the best orchid gossip. I like to be involved in plants as much as possible: in addition to Longwood, I've worked at the Smithsonian Institution tending to their orchids, and for years for the United States National Arboretum, collecting rare plants and documenting cultivated species and hybrids for their herbarium.

For your meeting, I'll be sharing a presentation on recent advances in Lycaste breeding, culture, and growing. These plants are easy to grow and flower, are vigorous, and have low demands on culture, and as such are wonderful plants! Tremendous advancements in breeding Lycastes have been made recently, and I will share some of these with you, as well as help identify some of the important species in the backgrounds of historically important and modern Lycastes. By the end of this presentation, you will have a new appreciation of what goes into breeding trends for these types of plants, as well as an appreciation of their beautiful flowers and ease-of-growth. I will be providing a sales of the newest, modern, cutting-edge Lycaste breeding.

#### **Remembering Richard Stone**

Dick Stone was president of Peninsula OS in 1960. He and his wife Isabelle were married for 73 years. She passed in 2016 and Dick passed recently. Dick was known for his hybridizing and registered many crosses, some named for members of his family. These hybrids included Cattleya Isabelle Stone (C. sincorana x C. coccinea), other Cattleya hybrids, several oncidium and intergeneric hybrids made with Oncidium Tiger Butter, and an Oncostele. I was able to find eleven hybrids as they were named for his family members. I'm sure there are many more. Frank Fordyce named Cattleya Richard Stone (Bo's Gold x Golden Ransom) for him in 2003. He had large greenhouses during his prime growing years and he maintained an intricate cloud forest container in his apartment in Palo Alto until the time of his passing. Some of the plants on our August opportunity table came from this collection, including a Maxillaria acervata (yellow form) that he collected himself in Costa Rica, pre-Cites.



What does the show chair do? Most of the job is done long before the show. The show chair leads the show committee and keeps track of the schedule. In addition to the show chair, the show committee consists of four members who are responsible for advertising, vendors, judging, scheduling speakers, recruiting the remaining show chairs, selecting a show theme and special prizes, and organizing set-up. Our application to the AOS for judging has been submitted. Soon it will be time for the show committee to start planning the show. Are YOU willing to put in some time to make this another great show?
