Jason Fischer

Jason Fischer helps manage Orchids Limited in Plymouth, Minnesota USA with his father Jerry Fischer. Orchids Ltd. opened in 1978. Orchids Ltd. is a mid-sized operation of 4 greenhouses with 15,000 square feet of growing space, a shade house, and laboratory located in Plymouth, MN.

Jason has had a life-long education in orchids mainly from the opportunity to be raised in a family orchid business. Jason's educational interests were strongly influenced by Japan. He studied the Japanese language and culture for 6 years in high school and at the University of Minnesota. Jason lived in Kyoto, Japan from 2001 to 2003, and upon return decided to import Japanese orchid species and add a new niche to the business.

Having worked for his father since the age of 5, Jason has learned the orchid world from the business and hobbyist's perspective. He took interest in orchid hybridization and lab work around 14 years of age, and first started breeding with phalaenopsis, which later on lead to paphs, phrags and miscellaneous hybrids.

Jason's first lecture on Neofinetia falcata at the Minnesota Orchid Society in 2004 was the kickoff for an international speaker's circuit which went on until 2020. Now, Jason presents via Zoom as remote lectures have become the new standard. He has a passion for orchids, and the communication skills he developed in Japan as an English teacher have helped him create interesting lectures that won't put the audience to sleep!

Jason enjoys photographing orchids in situ, and has photographed orchids in situ in Japan, North America, Singapore, Malaysia and Western Australia. His main interests include hybridizing Vanda falcata varieties and Phragmipedium



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Fall is upon us, so as orchidists this brings up a long list of tasks related to keeping our plants safe and growing well over the winter. It's the time of year to finish up repotting, although I know that for some of us this is a never-ending chore. If you're still repotting, hopefully it's plants like Laelia purpurata that have a fall flush of roots in late October ad November, but even these it's best to finish by mid-October.

It's also time to start winterizing your growing area. If you have plants in a heated greenhouse or growing area, do a test on your heating system to make sure it's working. There's still plenty of time to get it fixed before the colder weather of November strikes. The growing area should also be checked for areas with large air gaps, so the warmer air of the growing area doesn't escape too quickly at night. Of course, this can be difficult this time of year, since some of our hottest weather comes in October, not long before those night-time temperatures plummet.

Do a general clean-up of your growing area. Clean the plants of old spikes and bracts that could hold too much moisture against the plant during the colder winter months. Try to remove most of the organic debris from the floor – this just becomes a slip hazard as evaporation of water on the floor reduces during shorter days. If it's possible, a little extra space between plants during the winter allows for quicker drying between watering.

There is also a good selection of fall blooming orchids, so staking these now so they'll perform at their best is a good idea. Some of those just developing spikes now, such as Laelia anceps, might even be blooming for our January show. I know that's planning a long time in advance, but sometimes it's the right thing to do.

Speaking of planning in advance and our January show, we still need someone to step up to be show chair, or a couple people to be co-chairs. There will be lots of members around to help, so the show chair's job is largely just making sure someone is responsible for each job that needs to be done. For someone with good organizational skills, it should be fairly straightforward.

If the show chair is too big a job, consider being a member of the POS board next year. The board members tried to provide a snapshot of what they do during the August meeting skill session, and a couple people have shown interest in joining the board. While some positions like treasure and membership require specific skills, other positions, like director at large (or President) really only require members to discuss and vote on issues at board meetings. We usually have fun seeing each other at the board meetings, which are all virtual so they won't take too much time. If you might be interested, let any member of the nominating committee know, or talk to Chaunie since she's the head of the committee.

Remember, the board members are here to help things go smoothly, and to ensure the club functions the way you want it to function. If you have ideas or comments, send them to us.

Remembering Jean Lee

Jean Lee passed away on August 1 this year after a short illness. Jean was president of San Francisco Orchid Society nine of the years between 1993 and 2012. She served on their board in other positions as well and was a driving force behind POE and Orchids in the Park.

Jean was also a member of Peninsula OS. People who work hard for an orchid society like to belong to other orchid societies where they can just enjoy their time at meetings and shows without major responsibilities. We would occasionally see her at a meeting and she usually visited our January show.

She worked at Stanford Research Institute (SRI) as a biologist on an amazingly wide variety of projects. Jean was an avid photographer, artist, collector of gems and minerals, Japanese wood blocks and bronze sculptures of animals. Jean also found time to volunteer with the Garden Club and Auxiliary as well as at the Conservatory of Flowers, where she found herself at the time of the Loma Prieta earthquake in 1989.

Jean's leadership, friendship, knowledge and kindness will be missed by many, many people.
