Dennis Olivas was born on the island of Kauai, Hawaii. As a lad, his helped his mom and aunt grow their orchids and got hooked. He joined the Future Farmers of America and his project was raising and selling these beautiful and exotic plants. In 1980 he moved to the mainland and swore off the orchid family; not for long as he went to the Rod McLeallan's Acres of Orchids' in South San Francisco. From there his whole life became one downward spiral. First he fills his home with upwards of 6,000 plants. Later he leased a greenhouse space for his ever burgeoning orchid collection. Glutton for punishment, his collection grew overflowing the 3,000 sq. ft. greenhouse in Half Moon Bay.

With the help of his close friends, from the Bay Area, Napa and Fresno, they moved his obsession to a greenhouse in Daly City in November of 2013. A whole new ball game of learning how to raise orchids, still without heat but in an area that gets more sun and higher temperatures, good water year round.

He has served as President for the Peninsula Orchid Society (1994, 1998, 1999 and 2007), San Francisco Orchid Society, Diablo View Orchid Society and the Santa Cruz Orchid Society. He is an accredited judge of the American Orchid Society. Dennis belongs to over 14 orchid societies and tries to assist them when ever possible.



If you do decide to provide some plants a little extra care, put them back on the bench in the same orientation as they were before. Otherwise, the spikes could develop sharp changes in direction as the incidence of the light will be different.

One other small item for this month: if any of you want to write a short article, be it all words, or mostly photographs, for upcoming issues of The Sheath, those articles would be welcome and appreciated! I'm sure you are tired of the same people (me, for instance) going on about this issue or that, month after month. The chance to provide extra variety is in your hands! HOW TO PURCHASE CORK BARK FROM MARYLAND CORK

If you find that you would like to have more than a couple of pieces of cork on hand for mounting orchids you may want to purchase a box of cork from Maryland Cork. I recently purchased a box that I split with another POS member, after learning the details of how to do this from Helena Wee, who learned from Tom Mudge.

You need to the company at 1-800-662-2675, Monday - Thursday, 8am - 4pm EST.

The first question I received was "granular or virgin"? I wasn't prepared for this question but went with virgin, which was the correct answer.

Then you need to tell them flat or round and approximate thickness. I asked for flat, 1 to 2 inches thick.

They fill a large box - 36"x18"x18" - with cork pieces of varying sizes and ship it to you. The cork is sold by the pound. They don't know until they have filled your box how many pounds it will hold. The weight varies between 28-40 lbs. They also don't know until they ship it how much the shipping will cost.

You provide them with your credit card number and your shipping address. I received my box about a week after ordering it.

My box had 33 lbs of cork @ \$3.95/lb, the box cost \$4, and shipping via UPS was \$90. I unpacked the box, made piles of approximately the same size pieces, then divided them about in half. Then I used my baby scale (actually, at our house it is a cat scale) to weigh groups of pieces to finish dividing into two equal groups.

Now I can mount orchids any time I want without worrying that I am going to get something that will need that piece of cork more than the thing I am considering mounting.

Also, you can learn about cork bark harvesting and wine bottle cork making on YouTube. The bark is removed from the oak trees every nine years. The tree is not harmed. The first year it is harvested it is called virgin cork. It is not desirable for use in making wine corks, the following years the bark is used to make corks.



Jis Sebastian: Orchid Science in India: Current Perspectives & Future Challenges

Jis has worked in the Western Ghats, India's Western & Eastern Himalayas, involved in research, conservation, and community outreach. She is currently running research, conservation, and capacity-building programs in Orchid science and a climate-resilient, sustainable community model initiative in Idukki, Kerala.

Henry Oakeley: Orchid Hunting in Peru

Henry has been growing orchids for 65 years, concentrating on Lycaste, Ida, and Anguloafor nearly 50 years. He is a Physician Emeritus and Garden fellow for the Royal College of Physicians of London medicinal garden. For the past ten years, his primary interest has been the history and uses of medicinal plants.

John Varigos: Borneo–Land of Wonder & Biodiversity

John, a pharmacologist and clinical trialist, has grown orchid species for over 40 years. He is an avid orchid photographer (over 20,000 photos on Flickr) and, for the past 20 years, has enjoyed traveling the world, trekking the jungles, and finding and photographing orchids in situ.

Jim Cootes: Orchid Species of the Philippines

Jim's interest in Philippine orchids started in the late 1970s when he visited the mountains of central Luzon. He saw many orchids that he could not identify, so he created a database. From this material, he has written 2 books and is working on the third volume as well as co-authored a book on Philippine dendrobiums.
